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Gta 5 offline play

If you've just got GTA 5 for free from the Epic Games Store and you're jumping into GTA Online for the first time, get ready for some big differences. GTA Online is a packed multiplayer experience with almost seven years' worth of updates. It's a big, complicated game with an absolutely dizzying array of vehicles, businesses and activities to check out. Crucially, too, you're sharing the world with up to 29 other players, which takes a big of getting used to. GTA Online will eat as many hours as you want to put into it, with deep progression systems, loads of expensive properties to buy and tons of vehicles to collect. Over the years, we've spent a fair few hours with GTA Online, and wanted to share our advice for how newcomers can play the game without having a bad time. Hopefully you'll find this useful.1. Find some friends, get used to the game and increase your rank(Image credit: Rockstar Games)The key with GTA Online is finding friends you can regularly enjoy playing with. This makes so many activities in the game easier, more lucrative and more fun. Playing GTA Online solo is possible, but it's half the experience in a lot of ways. When you start GTA Online, you create a character, do a tutorial and are unleashed into Los Santos. Epic's giveaway of GTA 5 comes with the Criminal Enterprise Starter pack, a bumper selection of goodies to get you started in GTA Online. This gives you a number of free items, including a suite of weapons and vehicles to use. Rockstar Games explains what comes with the pack here. Note, though, that we played GTA Online long before this pack existed, and can't completely vouch for how this affects the early part of the online experience. You also get an executive office, a gunrunning bunker and a biker gang hideout, all of which offer various ways to make you more money from the start. You can access activities in each of these locations from the laptop you'll find inside each building. Epic's free edition of GTA will also grant you a million dollars of free in-game currency, though it'll take a week or so to appear in your account. We think you should spend \$200,000 of that on an in-game apartment which has the ability to initiate heists, and we'll explain why below. In terms of aspirational vehicles, military chopper the Buzzard is a good one to aim for. That costs \$1.75 million, so you'll need to save up a bit, but it'll quickly get you around the map and provide firepower from the sky. There are reasons you'll want to increase your rank (that is, your level) quickly when starting GTA Online. Going up a few ranks will lead to characters like Simeon and Lamar contacting you with missions via your phone, giving you more ways to unlock money and RP. GTA's version of experience points. Weapon purchases are also tied to your rank. If you want to buy a Micro SMG from a weapon store, for example, you need to be rank 5 first. So it's worth trying to get through those early levels quickly.2. GTA Online heists are a good way to make money, and the most fun part of the game(Image credit: Rockstar Games)GTA has five heists (including a tutorial heist), and if you're new to the game, you owe it to yourself to check them out. They're like the heists in GTA 5's main story, only they involve four players taking part in one mission simultaneously. They still represent the best GTA experiences you can have in any game in the series. To access heists, you either need to join another player's heist, or reach level 12 in-game and host your own. Crucially, you'll want three other friends to play the heists with (you can matchmake, but it's precarious, and playing all four heists with the same crew nets you a bonus payout). That hopefully won't be too much of a challenge if you know other people who have grabbed the game for free and have half-decent PCs.One of your group of four will need what's called a High-End apartment in GTA Online, which apparently doesn't come with the Criminal Enterprise Starter Pack. This is how you host a heist. You can buy this by bringing up your phone in-game, going to the internet browser and clicking on Money and Services. Dynasty 8 is the online store that sells apartments in-game. The cheapest apartment to feature a heist room is Del Perro Heights, which is \$200,000, easily covered by the free money gifted by Rockstar with this version of the game. Again, to host a heist, you need to be rank 12 or higher. It's not a bad idea for all players involved to at least reach rank 12, to ensure everyone is up to the challenge of these large-scale missions. With three other players in your crew, you can enter the heist room in your new apartment and begin these missions strands. Each heist is divided into separate setup stages with a finale, and you get a first-time bonus payout for finishing them all (and another for finishing them in order). Note that each heist has a setup cost, which you'll easily be able to afford if you haven't blown all your free million dollars of in-game currency at once. You'll easily make this setup money back from completing each one. When you get deeper into the game, you can think about taking on the Doomsday and Diamond Casino Heists, too, but for now tackling the basic heists is all you need to worry about. Repeating them on higher difficulties earns you bigger payouts. If you're a solo player, heists are a less dependable source of income, and you might want to try this excellent Reddit guide on playing GTA alone. 3. Don't bother with competitive modes unless they're paying double experience and cash(Image credit: Rockstar Games)GTA Online has so many online competitive modes (called Adversary Modes), but they're rarely as fun as doing activities in the open world with friends. Still, there are reasons you'll want to play them, especially if you're new to the game. Each week, Rockstar usually highlights a certain Adversary Mode with double the rewards (not this week, though, as the double bonus is for gunrunning sell missions). This will allow you to quickly increase your rank and make a bit of cash while you take part. Look out for messages on your phone that invite you to adversary modes, and click on them to enter a matchmaking screen. Again, they're only really worth focusing on when the payout is doubled. Don't burn yourself out on PvP, because it's not the best part of GTA Online, even though some of the modes can be pretty fun. 4. You can have your cars delivered at any time(Image credit: Rockstar Games)This is far from a headline feature, but it's handy to know in case you miss the game's explanation of how it works. Bring up your phone, click on the Mechanic name in your contacts, call him and you can have any of your stored vehicles brought to you, usually a short walk from where you're standing. You'll use this countless times as you play GTA to save time, and it's worth knowing. 5. Strangers will try and grief you, so turn on Passive Mode(Image credit: Rockstar)Griefing is almost baked into the design of GTA Online. If you want to explore Los Santos without other players being able to ruin it for you, press 'M' on your keyboard to bring up what's called the Interactions menu. From here, scroll down to Passive Mode and turn it on. This will stop players from being able to shoot you. Note, though, that a whole bunch of GTA Online activities require you to play in a public server and switch Passive Mode off. Interrupting other players' fun is the lifeblood of GTA Online, and you will end up doing it yourself, too. It's why it's such a relief on those rare occasions when you find an empty server, so you can make a bit of money without the threat of someone airstriking you mid-mission. It's a temporary solution, then, but it will make the act of exploring the world a bit less irritating in your first hours with the game. 6. Resist buying Shark Cards unless you get deep into the game(Image credit: Rockstar Games)Everything in GTA Online can be paid for with in-game currency, but earning money is time-consuming in this game, especially if you want to buy some of the fancier vehicles that cost millions of in-game dollars. Rockstar sells in-game currency in the form of Shark Cards, giving you a quick cash injection to get you the thing you want. You don't need to buy these to have a good time in GTA Online, though. If you throw hours upon hours at GTA Online, you can maybe justify spending a little every now and then for that car, business or apartment you want, especially since you got the game for free from Epic. Ultimately, though, buying digital currency is unlikely to enhance your experience with the game unless you're playing it all the time. 7. Focus on the activities you enjoy(Image credit: Future/Rockstar Games)When you start GTA Online, it can take some adjustment to the new status quo. There's so much to do on the map and you're constantly pinged with new activities on your phone. Not everything in the game is great, but you don't have to play all of it to have a good time. Owning a nightclub isn't as fun as it should be, for example, even if the real DJs that play there are a cool touch. Owning a hangar is really neat, especially with some of the cool customizable aircraft available, but it's a very expensive pursuit that shouldn't be your priority early on. Some of the vehicles you can buy look awesome, but earning enough currency to unlock them can take hours and hours. The heists are the clear standout in GTA Online in terms of actual early game fun stuff. Some of the different businesses you can buy do have fun activities associated with them depending on what they are (and this free edition should give you plenty of businesses to sample), but there's also a hell of a lot of driving from one side of the map to the other for so many of the missions in the game. Try not to fall into a pattern where you feel like you're stuck in a grind. (Image credit: Rockstar)Over the past few years, Rockstar has become more and more generous in giving out free GTA money, just for logging on during a certain period. At the start of this year it gave away \$2 million just for turning the game on twice in two weeks. Keep an eye on Rockstar Games' social channels for any similar promotions. They're not that regular, but they'll usually occur a few times a year, and if you're new to the game, it'll be enough cash to make a serious difference. You can let these build up and buy a silly vehicle that you really want.Rockstar is currently giving away \$500,000 to all players who log in during May 2020. Create a new name for your downloaded game and it should create a new file extension ".fop" for you. Right-click on the FlashOffliner icon and select "Install FlashOffliner Option." There are more than 20 biomes and mini-biomes to explore, with advanced building options that are easy to learn, so you can create amazing structures. When starting out, we recommend the Terraria Wiki guide, which will help you build your character in the early days. You can play alone offline — so you don't need internet connectivity unless you're planning on playing with friends in online multiplayer mode. Google Play Eternium (free) One for all the old-school role-playing game (RPG) fans out there, Eternium is free to play, and you can access most features offline. Choose to play as a mage, bounty hunter, or warrior, battling your way across three gorgeous handcrafted worlds packed with castles, dungeons, caves, forests, and villages to explore, or level up and learn new abilities across a range of endless randomly-generated levels in the Trials of Valor game mode. Along the way, battle skeletons, demons, dragons, and more, or team up with your companions to take down harder enemies and be rewarded with rare, epic, and legendary gear. Google Play Sonic Dash (free) Sonic Dash transforms the classic platform game into an immersive and endless running experience. Play as Sonic or his fellow comrades — including Knuckles and Tails — and dash your way through a variety of maps. The game introduces unique mechanics like Sonic's homing attack and periodic hazard events that make each run different. You'll even be able to face off against two the biggest villains in the Sonic franchise: Dr. Eggman and Zazz from Sonic Lost World. Google Play Tiki Taka Soccer (free) Whether you're a fan of soccer — or football, depending on your location — or not, Tiki Taka Soccer offers most if not all the aspects of the sport with a retro-style twist. Simplistic and easy-to-learn controls make the game playable for people of all ages. This is the perfect game for soccer fans across the world. Google Play Earn to Die 2 (free) In a zombie-filled apocalyptic world, the only way to escape is to drive your way through. Carrying the momentum of a successful first version, Earn to Die 2 introduces the same side-scrolling game-play but with a new story mode that's five times longer than the original. As simple as it sounds to drive through piles of zombies, strategy is required to beat the game. You must factor in the amount of gas you have, the durability of your car, and even when to accelerate and break to optimize your mileage. The rescue ship isn't waiting forever, so hop on and ride your way to peace and safety. Google Play Dumb Ways to Die 2: The Games (free) Dumb Ways to Die took games by storm, and Dumb Ways to Die 2: The Games is just as good. The setup is simple — play a range of dumb but fast-paced minigames to score points and compete in the Dumb Ways to Die Games. There's a large range of games to compete in, and most are very easy to understand. However, it's so fast-paced you should expect to die a few times before it clicks. But that's part of the game, and something you should embrace rather than avoid. Ads are served for retries, or you can pay to bypass that — with the fast pace, you may end up watching a lot of ads. It's a lot of fun regardless. Google Play Rayman Adventures (free) Everyone's favorite French platformer is back, and he's on mobile. Rayman Adventures is everything you expect from a Rayman game — unique visuals, kooky designs, and tight platforming action — sewn up into an Android game. You can play as more than 55 characters across seven different worlds as you grow your Sacred Tree to unlock new adventures. Hunt down the Ancient Eggs, hatch up to 320 different Incrediballs, and use them to ... er, beatbox? Apparently so. It's a wild ride, and one that's hard to say no to. Google Play Rebel Inc. (free) Do you have what it takes to pacify a rebellious region following a devastating and destabilizing war? Rebel Inc. gives you the tools to prove you can. To keep your assigned region under control, you'll have to balance spending resources on military and civilian priorities, from instituting reading programs to build literacy levels, to constructing new guard outposts and hiring foreign soldiers to help keep the peace. The Wolf Among Us tells the story of Bigby Wolf, otherwise known as "the big bad wolf", as he polices the magical community hiding in plain sight. Based on the award-winning Fables comic series by Bill Willingham, The Wolf Among Us challenges you to solve a brutal, bloody murder in a world where your choices matter. Set before the events of the Fables series, this is the perfect place to start with this series. The first part is available for free, with episodes 2 to 5 available for purchase within the game. Google Play Monument Valley 2 (\$5) Monument Valley 2, the sequel to the 2014 sensation, introduced a heartfelt bond between mother and child. Protagonist Ro guides her child through the gorgeous, dream-like puzzle levels. The environments themselves are even more pleasant than the already delightful original. Seeing landscapes change with your inputs is perhaps an even cleverer illusion than the actual puzzles. Relaxing, moving, and utterly mesmerizing, Monument Valley 2 is one of the best puzzle-adventures on Android. Google Play Hitman GO (\$6) Agent 47's move from stealth to tactical strategy made a whole ton of sense thematically. But we doubt anyone expected Hitman Go to be one of the better turn-based games around on mobile. Each grid-based level plays out like a game of chess. Characters are even rendered as model figures. Dispatching enemies while working through rooms is just as satisfying as it typically is in real time. Mechanically sound and wonderfully designed, Hitman Go is the turn-based puzzle game you never knew you needed. No prior knowledge of the Hitman franchise is required to fully enjoy it, either. Google Play Alto's Odyssey (free) Keeping in step with its predecessor, Alto's Odyssey is an automatic runner that replaces running shoes for a nifty snowboard. Unlike the original which stuck with conventional snowy alps, Alto's Odyssey takes place throughout several desert-themed chapters. Chapters contain randomly generated areas to keep the experience fresh. The star here is the simplistic gameplay, which continuously has a level of freedom and joy to it rarely seen in the popular mobile genre. Google Play The Witness (\$14) A collection of 523 line puzzles scattered across a majestic and mysterious island. The Witness is one of the best puzzle games ever made. Using rules cleverly learned through play, The Witness' puzzles gradually increase in difficulty. Soon you'll be using the environment around you to assist in solving puzzles and it won't take long until you're obsessively working on solutions both in your head and on scraps of paper. Google Play To the Moon (\$5) Johnny Wyles is dying and wants to go to the moon, though he doesn't know why. He enlists the help of two doctors who help to recreate memories of his life en route to granting his dying wish. From there, To the Moon quickly turns into a moving love story. More narrative experience than a game, To the Moon is well-written and accompanied by wonderful 16-bit visuals. If you want a great yarn, To the Moon holds one of the best game narratives on Android. Google Play Plague Inc. (free) A mainstay on the Google Play charts since its 2012 launch, Plague Inc. is one of the most satisfying and diabolical real-time strategy games around. At the start of each simulation, you create a virus that will hopefully wipe out the entire population (yes, it's twisted). Thoroughly engaging and somewhat educational, Plague Inc. makes creating pandemics an experience that you'll never get sick of (sorry). Google Play Downwell (\$3) Welltaro decides to explore a way. That's the premise of Downwell and an obvious one at that. What follows is a frenetic roguelike game centered around perpetual downward motion. Guiding Welltaro, you must avoid obstacles and enemies with the help of gunboats that only recharge when touching the ground. Downwell's levels are randomly generated, which makes each run different than the last. Designed to be played in portrait mode with minimalist monochromatic visuals, Downwell is an excellent, if very challenging, time waster. Google Play Stardew Valley (\$5) Perhaps the ultimate town management game on Android and one of the defining games of this generation, Stardew Valley sets up well for mobile. It's the perfect experience to play for short chunks of time every day. But you can also log long stretches in Pelican Town quite easily. Taking care of your crops and making small talk with the folks of Pelican Town is surprisingly rewarding. Stardew Valley's charming writing, endearing visuals, and additive gameplay make it one of the best games on Android. It also happens to be one of the best games on Android. Google Play Wayward Souls (\$7) A dungeon crawler, Wayward Souls excels in delivering a satisfying and strategic action fit for mobile devices. And even successful runs don't take very long. Surprisingly deep combat and six unique characters to choose from help make Wayward Souls stand out among a sea of average dungeon crawlers on Android. The goal is to accumulate 10,000,000 points to escape the dungeon. Along the way, you tinker with rows and columns to match three icons in a row. Successful matches grant attacks, let you pile up loot, and even level your character. Puzzles change as you progress further through the dungeon. While it takes a few runs to get the hang of it all, 10000000 is a great choice for anyone wanting to shake things up and play something genuinely novel. Google Play Florence (\$3) A wordless love story, Florence is a stellar visual novel that can be completed in one sitting. It magically re-creates the feeling of falling in and out of love with the help of gorgeous animations and simplistic puzzles. The puzzles themselves, though simple, cleverly help inform the player of the emotions of Florence and her boyfriend. Florence has one of the best love stories in gaming, and it accomplishes this feat without using words. That alone makes it worth a playthrough. Google Play Limbo (\$5) Playdead A masterclass in minimalism, Playdead's Limbo is an utterly unforgettable puzzle-platformer. You play as a young boy, working through ominous environments rendered entirely in shades of black and white as he desperately looks for his missing sister. The puzzles range from clever brain teasers to inventive physics puzzles. The star here is the chilling atmosphere, which is an unrelenting and omnipresent force. The game's graphics are not only creepy but often gruesomely detailed — especially when it comes to the boy's potential deaths. Google Play Final Fantasy Tactics: The War of the Lions (\$12) If you excel in tactical role-playing games, Final Fantasy Tactics: The War of the Lions might become one of your favorite games.
